


Image of the original military order modified to include only order No. 3

### Our Senators Celebrate Juneteenth

Who gets it, and who is just mouthing expected platitudes?

● **Senator Bob Casey, via his official website, [06/19/20](#):**

"On Juneteenth, we commemorate President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation on the day—June 19, 1865—when news of emancipation reached people in the deepest parts of the former Confederacy in Galveston, Texas. This day came two months after the end of the Civil War and more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation, a gap which represents a delay in justice that persists to this day. Slavery was officially abolished across the Nation several months later in December of 1865 with the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment.

Juneteenth is a celebration and an inspiration for this generation and future generations to come. It is a day to celebrate Black culture and history across our Commonwealth and our Nation. And it is a day for allies like myself to pledge to lift up Black Americans year-round. As we celebrate Juneteenth in the midst of cries for justice, we are called to listen, learn and take action to create change. It is not enough to recognize one important date in history. Once we spend this day in reflection and celebration, we must act. We must propel our Nation forward toward progress.

I'm proud that Pennsylvania is one of 47 states which recognize Juneteenth as a state holiday, and I believe our Nation should recognize this important day in American history as a federal holiday. But commemorating Juneteenth is not a substitute for taking decisive action to protect the lives of Black Americans. Recent events in our Nation highlight that we have yet to overcome all the vestiges of slavery. Black Americans continue to be disproportionate victims of hate crimes and police brutality, and the recent murders of George Floyd and others underscore the inadequacy of passivity and the cruel impact that slavery, and much of its aftermath, has had on our country and its citizenry.

Though Juneteenth celebrations may look different this year, the significance of the day is not diminished. Let us celebrate and elevate our Black communities and let us use this day to reflect on the work that remains to conquer racism in America. We cannot accept a system— informed by centuries-old prejudices and racial bias—that turns a blind eye to injustice and disregards the value of Black life.

It is past time for our federal government to formally recognize the day when Major General Gordon Granger proclaimed that Americans who had been enslaved in the Confederacy were now emancipated. June 19, 1865 was the dawn of a new era, a jubilant day which has come to represent the strength and resilience of Black Americans. 155 years later, I see this strength and resilience in Black Pennsylvanians. And on this Juneteenth, I am thinking critically about the ways our government has failed Black communities since that fateful day in Galveston, when those who were enslaved were promised freedom and equality. Now, we must not only strive toward better, fairer policies, but we must work every day to pass them into law. Our entire Nation will be stronger for it.

This Juneteenth, and every day, Black Lives Matter."

## Votes of Interest

### The Senate funds the Land and Water Conservation Fund

[Senate Vote](#) on [H.R. 1957](#): Great American Outdoors Act

This bill is a collection of initiatives that deal with issues facing our National parks and wilderness programs. First it will permanently reauthorize the Land and Water Conservation Fund ([LWCF](#)), a program that protects federal public lands and waters and encourages voluntary conservation of private lands. This excellent program is funded not by taxpayer dollars, but by using fees paid by fossil fuel extraction corporations who pay the federal government to lease public lands. Specifically, it permanently sets aside \$900 million in oil and gas revenues to fund the LWCF.

There has also been a large backlog of renovation and maintenance tasks in our national parks. This bill appropriates \$6.5 billion to address those issues.

From a political perspective, many believe this bill was put on the floor of the Senate for a vote now because Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell wanted to provide some campaign assistance to a pair of his most vulnerable GOP senators - Cory Gardner of Colorado and Steve Daines of Montana - as this is legislation that is quite popular in western states. That aim was telegraphed best by a [tweet from President Trump](#), that applauded the pair for their efforts in putting this bill together.

It is expected that the House will bring this bill to the floor soon, and President Trump has already indicated he wants to sign it into law.

**Vote Tally:** **73-25**

**Party Breakdown:** All Democrats and Independents present voted YES, and they were joined by 28 Republicans. The only NO votes came from Republicans.

**Judicial Confirmation**

[Senate Confirmation Vote](#) on Justin Reed Walker to be United States Circuit Judge for the District of Columbia Circuit

The D.C. Circuit is often referred to as the second most powerful court in the land, as it is tasked with overseeing cases that relate to legal challenges to the conduct of the national government. And the Trump Administration nominated a 37-year-old judge who they only elevated to the judiciary less than a year ago! This is how our friends at [The Vetting Room](#) lay out the circumstances of this promotion of a judge that the American Bar Association rated as “unqualified”:

Last October, a former clerk to Justices Anthony Kennedy and Brett Kavanaugh was appointed to the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Kentucky, despite having never tried a single case. What the nominee lacked in trial experience, however, he made up for in media experience, having made 162 media appearances in support of Kavanaugh’s Supreme Court confirmation. Now, despite only being a judge for six months, Judge Justin Walker has been handpicked by Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, with the recommendation of Kennedy and Kavanaugh, for elevation to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit.

The [Alliance for Justice](#) is equally scornful of this nomination, and they refer to this as promotion of a judge to the second most important court in the land after serving as a judge for less than a year as “McConnell loyalist being rewarded for dutiful service to the Republican Party.” They go on to provide this description of Judge Walker’s philosophies:

He has extreme views on unchecked executive power. He wants to weaken gun safety measures, including bans on assault weapons. He has shown contempt for public education. And, he would use his position on the powerful D.C. Circuit to weaken civil rights, worker, consumer, and environmental protections. He has been vehement in his opposition to the Affordable Care Act (“ACA”) and is committed to using the courts to do what Trump, McConnell, and the Republican Party could not do through Congress— take away access to quality health care from millions, including people with preexisting conditions.

**Vote date:** Thursday, June 18, 2020 **Vote Tally:** 51-42  
**Party Breakdown:** All Democrats and Independents present voted NO, and they were joined by Maine Republican Sen. Susan Collins. The remaining Republicans voted YES.

## Learning about Legislation - Comparing House & Senate Police Reform Bills

Last week, MoCTrack brought you some information about [H.R. 7201, the Justice in Policing Act](#). This is the House bill that is designed to address police brutality and law enforcement reform. This is a bill that was introduced by members of the Congressional Black Caucus and has the backing of the Democrats in the House. And just this week [it passed through the Judiciary Committee](#), and is expected to get to the House floor for a vote in the next week.

This past Wednesday, the Senate Republicans introduced their own policing reform bill, the Justice Act (Just and Unifying Solutions to Invigorate Communities Everywhere). This bill is so new that the clerk's office has not provided it an identifying number, but Sen. Scott has made the [full text](#) and a [section by section analysis](#) available.

Let's take a look at several key issues, side by side.

For those first five categories, it is key to note that the wording in the House bill is significantly stronger than that which is in the senate bill. For example, the House bill has an outright ban on

“the application of any pressure to the throat or windpipe, use of maneuvers that restrict blood or oxygen flow to the brain, or carotid artery restraints which prevent or hinder breathing or reduce intake of air is a punishment, pain or penalty.” The working in the Senate bill is that “The attorney general shall develop a policy for federal law enforcement agencies that bans the use of chokeholds except when deadly force is authorized.” While the Senate version uses the word ‘ban’ it then goes on to carve a huge loophole by dropping in the ‘except...’ Law enforcement officials are permitted to use deadly force when they feel they are in fear for their life. So almost any police officer could defend their use of a chokehold under the Senate’s weak wording. This same weakness in wording in the Senate bill continues throughout those other sections.

It is also key to provide a note about those two areas where the Senate bill contains content that the House bill left out. First, a cynic might observe that since the House made their offer first, from a public relations perspective it was a strategic move for the Senate version to find some areas that they could include that were not addressed in the House version, just so they could claim to be more comprehensive. And there is also the fact that the two areas in question - falsification of police reports and sexual contact between a law enforcement official and a prisoner - are already illegal. The Senate version just standardizes the federal response.

It is abundantly clear that the House version of law enforcement reform is the more aggressive of the two offerings. But these two bills will be changing in the coming weeks, as they undergo negotiations in their separate chambers. MoCTrack will keep you posted as these bills progress through Congress.
